Words from Worship ~ Epiphany



We've all heard people say, "I had an epiphany!"—meaning that they had an experience that made them suddenly realize something they hadn't realized before—it's usually something really important and life-changing, but sometimes the word is used for more trivial discoveries. In our church calendar, the 12-day season of Christmas is followed by Epiphany, January 6, commemoratimg God's revealing Jesus as the One He sent for all people of the world, Jew and Gentile alike, as seen in the magi who

came to Jerusalem from a country to the east of Israel (perhaps Persia, or Iran), to worship the newborn King of the Jews, King of the universe.

In the poem below, Stuart McAlpine, a pastor at Christ Our Shepherd Church in Washington, D.C., focuses on the magi as seekers after wisdom, imaginatively following the literal and figurative journey of one of the magi in his search for wisdom from Eden to Calvary. You might want to read and ponder Matthew 2:1-12 along with this poem as a devotional exercise on Sunday, January 6.*

"The journey of a wise (every) man"

I fell for fork-tongued hissing wiles, Believing that the tree would make me wise. I sold my soul for what beguiles, That damned me darkly deep to folly's guise.

Thus east of Eden, banished, I Would scan for pin-prick light the pit-bull black, And curse the eyeless, deaf, mute sky That mocked remorseful heart-pleas to go back.

Until that "just another" night, When not just any natal star white-burned And bade me follow its pure light. To westward, homeward my steps turned.

I knew where this star-path would wend. Was that not the Euphrates that we crossed? Where could this mystery journey end, But in the glades of paradise once lost? But where it halted, where it stayed, I tell you that no seer or sage could know. A child within a manger laid? Is this where wisdom would have bid me go?

In Bethlehem, not Eden's joy, But heaven's pristine glory come to earth; The second Adam as a boy, My paradise regained by this new birth.

They called me wise who saw me come, But I was altogether foolish, dim. Before I worshipped, I was dumb, I had no wisdom when I first found him.

I wide-eyed waited through the years. I followed his signs now, and not a star. Until the day when I once more wept tears, And watched a Roman gibbet from afar.

My mind raced back through centuries, To Eden's shame and Satan's lies. I fell again upon my knees. At last there was a tree to make me wise.

Missions News

It has been a while since we have heard from the Schaefer family. This fall they returned to the US for a furlough from their work among the Safaliba in Ghana. They are living in Marionville, Missouri, in the house where Paul's grandparents raised their two children. Since the Schaeffers have 4 children, they are short of bedrooms! So, while Jen and the children are busy with school, Paul is transforming the attic, adding rooms and constructing a gable and windows to give light to them.

Jen is working on a Doctor of Missiology degree. Due to the limited time they have in the US, Jen's supervisors are discussing special arrangements so that she can still hopefully get all her courses completed during this furlough time. Please pray that Jen will have all the time and other resources she needs in order to complete her coursework.

Caleb is doing well in his first semester as a high-school freshman. It has been a challenge for him to transition to public school, but he's stepped up to the challenge and is doing well. Micah attends the 6th grade at Marionville. He has also managed the transition very well, and is doing well in all his classes. Josiah is in 3rd grade. It has meant a lot of work for him, as there has been a steep curve to catch up on reading skills which weren't covered so well last year in the small school he enjoyed so much in Bole. But he's catching up well. Sarah has had a lot of fun this year in kindergarten. Her preschool in Bole was actually very rigorous so she had already learned her letters and numbers more thoroughly. And now they are moving into actual reading, which she is enjoying very See p. 6 for more much. Please pray for the kids to continue to have a good experience in school.

As always, thank-you for praying for us and for the translation work among the Safaliba people. Our Safaliba co-workers in Ghana have continued to be faithful in the work during our absence. We are particularly thankful for God's protection of Elisha Dari's life during a recent motorcycle acci-



dent. Elisha (at left, dressed in High Priest garments while the team is translating Exodus; at right, helping baptize new believers) had a badly-fractured knee and a damaged hand, but his helmet had protected his head and he is expected to be okay pending surgery to the knee. Please pray for the funds to pay for the medical expenses (approximately \$1500). Pray also for Elisha's family (wife and many children), during this time, and that Elisha would be fully healed and return to his ministries.

Elisha has been very faithful in the translation work. He has used the translated scriptures in teaching Sunday school and Bible Study in his church, and has also been a leader in evangelizing communities outside Mandari. For the past year he has been planting and caring for a new

church in a nearby Birifor village, and in March he and Stanley baptized about 40 new believers.



Elisha, Amaaliya, Nicholas, and the rest of our Safaliba co-workers have continued to work on the Bible translation and literacy work during our absence. Together we are

working through some selections from the book of Numbers. It has also been printed it so that it could be available for people to read. Amaaliya and Iddi (pictured at right) have continued to establish the

literacy class in Gbenfu and Nsunua. These literacy classes have formed the core of the Christian church in each village.
