

World Communion Sunday October 3, 2010



Ecumenical Observance Began in 1936

World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday) originated in the Presbyterian Church (USA). In 1936, for the first time, the first Sunday in October was celebrated in Presbyterian churches in the United States and overseas. From the beginning, it was planned so that other denominations could make use of it and, after a few years, the idea spread beyond the Presbyterian Church.

World Communion Sunday -- celebrated the first Sunday in October -- is one of the most venerable of "special Sundays." The day has taken on new relevancy and depth of meaning in a world where globalization often has undermined peace and justice -- and in a time when fear divides the peoples of God's earth. On this day we celebrate our oneness in Christ, the Prince of Peace, in the midst of the world we are called to serve -- a world ever more in need of peacemaking.

So, on the first Sunday of October 2010, Christians around the world will do as Christians have done since the 1930s—celebrate World Communion Sunday. Gathered around the table in cities and towns, in countries near and far, we will affirm our oneness in Christ, with each other, and with the church in every time and place. Although this unity is integral to each celebration of every Lord's Supper, many churches place special emphasis on it on World Communion Sunday. Often prayers will be offered in languages other than English, special breads will be used at Communion, and hymns representing various ethnic traditions will be selected.

*J. Lynn White is a biblical storyteller who has led biblical storytelling ministries in various church settings for the past twenty years. He currently serves as Immediate Past President of the Network of Biblical Storytellers International. An ordained minister of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), he holds a Bachelor of Arts from Transylvania University and Doctor of Ministry from Lexington Theological Seminary. Dr. White has served pastorates in Kentucky, North Carolina, Tennessee and Georgia prior to his current position as Senior Minister of Trinity Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Fort Worth, TX.

In addition to his long-term involvement in the Network of Biblical Storytellers International and leadership on its Board of Directors, Dr. White is also a member of the Network of Biblical Storytellers Seminar, a scholar's seminar made up of college & seminary professors, professional storytellers and clergy who make biblical storytelling a central dimension of ministry. He is also co-founder of Sacred Story Journeys, a travel ministry featuring biblical storytelling as part of scripture-based "pilgrimages."



Jim and Janet Stahl have been circling the globe this summer in their work with The Seed Company, an affiliate of Wycliffe Bible Translators. They started off with a time of learning at the Network of Biblical Storytellers in North Carolina, then travelled to Cordoba, Spain, for a conference to train other missionaries in the basics of Biblical story telling. From there they returned to the South Pacific, to Alotau, Papua New Guinea, to be exact.

This trip was a follow-up to a trip four months earlier and they wondered if the participants had continued to improve the Bible stories they had worked on before. They were impressed by what they found. Members of the ten language teams they had worked with were using biblical storytelling in their communities. One woman had been visiting the elderly and shut-ins who can't get to church and telling them Bible stories. Another group had been telling Bible stories in informal Sunday afternoon services at their church. Those who don't read love to hear the stories in their own language. They identify with the characters in the stories and their lives are impacted for good.

Storytelling in these cultures is an important part of their lives; it is a way to pass on knowledge and history from one generation to the next. Stories are even used to determine land ownership. Biblical stories fit well in their culture. Jim and Janet were encouraged that some experienced participants are taking leadership roles in teaching their communities as well.

Jim and Janet are thankful for your prayers for their work.

Journeys Through Revelation Apocalyptic Hope for Today

What comes to mind when you think of the book of *Revelation*? Scary images? The four horsemen come to unleash destruction? Mysterious numbers such as "666"? The endtime battle of Armageddon? In recent years, an enormous prophecy industry has marketed frightening images of *Revelation*, leaving many people intimidated by this amazing and often misunderstood book. Although brimming with mysterious symbolism, *Revelation* ultimately is a book of hope that throughout history has sustained people who are oppressed. It is a wonderfully Christ-centered book, full of worship and praise.

In the 2010–2011 Horizons Bible study, Journeys through Revelation: Apocalyptic Hope for Today, Barbara Rossing guides us on a journey to meet the crucified Lamb, Jesus. In a journey reminiscent of the ancient Israelites' exodus from slavery, we are led from an unjust empire and its system of domination, through mythic battles and plagues, until, ultimately, we find ourselves in a renewed creation where God comes to live with us on earth. This brilliantly hope-filled vision speaks to us in the midst of the urgent crises of our day. In a time when all of creation stands at a turning point, a kairos moment, Revelation can help guide the choices we make each day as we seek to live into the renewal that God has for the whole world. 

Property News

Dear Members and Friends of FPCD:

As most of you know, we are currently making an appeal to raise money for further improvements at the church. These include renovation of the restrooms in the Fellowship Hall to be handicap-accessible. The total cost of this project is \$16,685, and we have started a fund with \$2,500 already contributed. The need for handicap-accessible restroom facilities has been brought to our attention many times over the years and most recently as we have seen some of our aging members in wheel chairs dealing with this problem. Let's remember what Jesus said in Matthew 25, verse 40:

"I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."

Another need that we have in the Fellowship Hall is the replacement of the heavy brown chairs with lightweight chairs that can be folded and stored more easily, taking less room to store. The brown chairs are old and many are worn out, besides being very difficult to handle and move around. It will cost approximately \$2,500 to purchase new, lightweight folding chairs.

We would like to construct a permanent closet in the Fellowship Hall to replace the accordion door partition. The new closet would be built on the opposite side of the Fellowship Hall which would make the windows visible again, letting in light and making the room more attractive. The cost of building the new storage closet for our tables and chairs is \$2,400.

The Fellowship Hall, Entryway and Kitchen also need to be painted. The cost for painting these areas including all labor and materials is \$2,410. This includes painting the ceiling and repairing all water damage, etc on the walls.

The last need we have is replacing the flooring in the Fellowship Hall, Kitchen and Utility Room, as well as the classrooms off the Fellowship Hall. We plan to remove the carpet in the main Fellowship Hall area and replace it with tile which will be much easier to keep clean. The cost of tile for the Fellowship Hall and Kitchen is \$2,694. The cost for new carpet for the 3 classrooms off the Fellowship Hall is \$1,174.50. There is an additional cost of \$432 for the new baseboard for the entire area which includes the Fellowship Hall, Kitchen and all classrooms.

We would ask that you prayerfully consider these needs. There may be one particular area that you would like to sponsor. Our goal is to update our facilities, making them more comfortable and accessible for all. We sincerely feel that God will be honored with these endeavors. Helen Barton
