### **Symbols of our Faith: Harp**

This multi-stringed musical instrument is associated with David, who played to soothe King Saul, and later wrote many psalms, many accompanied by stringed instruments. The harp also represents praise music in general, as well as all the instruments people use to glorify God (see Psalm 71:22—1 will praise you with the harp for your faithfulness, O my God; I will sing praise to you with the lyre, O Holy One of Israel.). The idea that angels play harps may have come from Revelation 14:2 ("And I heard a voice from heaven like the sound of....harpists playing on their harps")—although in the next verse it turns out that the sound like many harpists is the singing of redeemed people like us, not angels. Psalm 150 unites harps and lyres with other instruments and dance as we join all creation in praise to God.

### Missions News ~ From Paul and Claudia Griffith

Well, these pictures do not look so exciting, do they? Just a guy helping another guy (Arnulfo Prado, a speaker of the old Aztec language and a national Bible translator for his own language) with a computer that needs fixing and a lady with a stack of books in the library. What is going on? And how do they relate to sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ with the whole world? That is just the point that excites us a whole lot!

We believe that the point is that God can use just ordinary folks like us—our talents, our interests, our education, our life experience—in the missions endeavor. We are pleased as punch, so to speak, that God has a place for us in helping people in Mexico know that Jesus loves them and that God has made



provision for their salvation for eternity through Christ and that He has told that story in a precious Book—the Bible, of course. And we strongly believe that every person on the face of this earth has the right to hear God's Word in his own heart language. That is why we are so pleased to be part of Wycliffe Bible Translators, whose #1 goal is exactly that.




No, we are not the ones actually doing Bible translation into one of the nearly 300 indigenous languages of Mexico. We are the helpers, so to speak. Our particular roles are for Paul to keep the translators' (both the nationals and the missionaries) computers in good repair, to help train them in using their computers, to trouble-shoot network and telephone problems and fix them; and for Claudia to provide a useful library that will enable our translators to study the cultures and languages in the areas where they work and to provide resources for our linguist/translators who are doing research and writing published scholarly papers. And so we have come full circle... because these are jobs for which we are well suited and gifted by God. We can honestly say that we have a role to play in the task of Bible translation and that we are so glad to be doing it here in Mexico.

We left Duncanville in July 2007 to work with Wycliffe Bible Translators here in Mexico . How do we like living here after four years? It has been an easy adjustment for both of us. We have very much enjoyed living among the Zapotec people here in Mitla, Oaxaca. They are a very friendly, polite, and kind people. And their culture is very different from American culture. We are always learning new and interesting details, which we greatly enjoy. For example, when a person dies the family hosts a burial or funeral feast for the guests. This is generally the next day after the death. But the spirit of the dead person sticks around for another 8 or 9 days. And when that spirit leaves to go to the spirit world, the family hosts a second funeral feast.

In many respects living in this community is reminiscent of life in the USA in the 1950's when we were children. People walk everywhere about town, and there is a lot of friendly visiting among folks on the streets. Women shop daily for the food that they will cook that day. There are no automatic dishwashers. We live in a community of about 10,000 people, but it is still very rural. Men and their dogs—and sometimes women—

## Presbyterian Women News

### Our PW 2011 Mission Focus

Our PW mission focus this year is in southeastern Africa. It is the Home of Hope, in Harare, Zimbabwe, a country with a wide variety of economic problems. The government's land reform program characterized by chaos and violence, has badly damaged the commercial farming sector, the traditional source of exports and foreign exchange and the provider of 400,000 jobs, turning Zimbabwe into a net importer of food products.



The ongoing political crises and violence in Zimbabwe have made efforts to reach out to vulnerable children and the destitute a nightmare. Home of Hope is struggling to make the situation more bearable for street children and their families. Security for children and ministries, project staff, and network staff has been a concern.

Mission workers, Joan Trevelyan and her team, including her son Craig, faithfully serve and bear witness to the love of Christ there. In addition to feeding and training at the Home of Hope, Joan provides breakfast six mornings a week to over 200 people living in the streets. She also provides scholarships and uniforms to over 100 school children and medical aid to many in need. Home of Hope remains a life saver to many in the city of Harare, where neither land nor employment are available to the street people and the widows.

One third of the proceeds of the December 3 PW Christmas Auction (see p. 4) will be sent for the work of Home of Hope. If you would like to give additional support to this work, go to www.theoutreachfoundation.org, the website of the Outreach Foundation (of the Presbyterian Church).

herd small flocks of animals: goats, sheep, turkeys on the loose, skinny cows. If you are old enough, do you remember cars with big speakers on top driving slowly down the streets making public announcements or advertising? I had not seen this for years, but they are everywhere here. This is just a glimpse of how we live and why we like it so much.

Are we experiencing any of the tensions that exist because of the drug wars? We are indeed! First of all, let us say that Oaxaca is not experiencing nearly as much terror as what exists along the border states. That is why we can remain. But we have had training in coping with security issues. We have learned how to be much more aware of our surroundings. The administration has just this year made the policy that we cannot drive to the border (praise God that it seems to be safe enough to drive down here in the interior of Mexico as long as we stay out of certain cities). There is the tension of always being aware that things could change and that we might have to leave Mexico at a second's notice. Still there is the joy of seeing the good things that are happening in the Bible Translation movement down here and having a part in all of it. We are glad that God has called us to be here.
