We join Joseph and Mary as they navigate through a world where no one can imagine what God has planned or how God will accomplish it. Beware: God's story requires a response, a "yes" to God; don't be afraid to open the gift.

Opening our hearts to God, we shift away from satisfaction in material things to deeper spiritual gains. Receive those freely. Then let your own giving be generous and unexpected; just like God's. Pray about what to give that expresses your faith rather than checking off a name on your list. Give to those in need, in someone else's name. Then sit by the tree for an hour and listen to the Hallelujah Chorus, knowing you have joined that magnificent chorus. Sing Go Tell It On the Mountain.

Many people of God have made the choice and gained that wonderful blessing of being a part of the story. May you be one of them this year.





What comes to mind when you think of the book of Revelation? Scary images, the four horsemen come to unleash destruction, mysterious numbers such as "666" or the endtime battle of Armageddon?



In recent years, an enormous prophecy industry has marketed frightening images of Revelation, leaving many people intimidated by this amazing and often misunderstood book. Although brimming with mysterious symbolism, Revelation ultimately is a book of hope that throughout history has sustained people who are oppressed. It is a Christ-centered book, full of worship and praise.

In this study Barbara Rossing guides us on a journey to meet the crucified Lamb, Jesus. In a journey reminiscent of the ancient Israelites' exodus from slavery, we are led from an unjust empire and its system of domination, through mythic battles and plagues, until, ultimately, we find ourselves in a renewed creation where God comes to live with us on earth. This brilliantly hope-filled vision speaks to us in the midst of the urgent crises of our day. In a time when all of creation stands at a turning point, a kairos moment, Revelation can help guide the choices we make each day as we seek to live into the renewal that God has for the whole world.

### Duncanville Outreach Ministries

Anita Davis, Director, reports that they are currently very busy giving food to families. An average of 28 families a day receive food assistance from DOM. What foods are currently needed? Almost all non-perishable foods, but NOT Ramen noodles. Everything else is needed-such as canned chili, vegetables, soups, fruit, tuna, and Hamburger helper type foods. Anita says that the food that is given to DOM, is usually given out the next day. So let's remember to include DOM in our grocery shopping and bring your gifts to the DOM basket in our church entryway.





Another way you can help is by taking items to DOM (202 E. Cherry St.) to stock their store "Thrifty Station." They need usable items you no longer need--knicknacks, games, clothing, CD's, DVD's, etc. --- everything but furniture! You can drop such items off Monday through Friday until 3pm going in the door facing Cherry St. which is marked for donations. Some wonderful volunteer sorters and stockers work there! And you won't want to forget to go shopping at Thrifty Station, Monday through Friday 9am - 3pm and Saturdays 10am - 1pm.

Keep in mind that the proceeds from Thrifty Station fund important services. Anita reports that DOM is currently providing assistance to twelve local families who are having to deal with serious medical problems such as cancer. These families receive assistance such as help with paying the rent, help with medications, and gift gas cards to help them go to medical clinics.



# Children's Sunday School

The elementary and intermediate aged children meet together on Sunday mornings at 9:15 in the room across from the nursery. The first three Sundays of November we focused on being thankful. Our Bible story for these three weeks was the story told in Luke 17 about Jesus healing the ten men who had a dreaded skin disease. It is likely that all ten men were happy to be healed, but only one of them actually took the time to return and thank Jesus for his healing. The application we are trying to put into practice from this story is to not only develop an attitude of gratitude for all God has done for us, but to also take the time and effort to verbally express our thanks to God and to others.

One way we are showing our thankfulness is to fill two shoeboxes full of little gifts for a boy and a girl in need. These two stuffed shoeboxes will be sent to a relief agency called Samaritan's Purse to be distributed along with many others to kids in different poor countries.

Stop by and see some things we are thankful for. If you look closely at the colorful leaves on our classroom tree, you will see some of the many things we are thankful for.

#### From the Youth Pastor



The Christmas season is right around the corner and the Youth Group is looking forward the Christmas festivities. On Sunday December 12th we will be going to Bethlehem revisited. Please consider joining us that night as we see what Israel was like in the 1st century.

During Sunday school and also Sunday Night youth meetings we have been studying the question "Why Choose Jesus?" Particularly we've been questioning whether the life Jesus calls us to is the best possible life. We've been able to explore questions about unmet needs and Jesus promise, "I have come that they may have life and have it to the full." Many students walk away from Jesus and the church after high school. I believe this is because they never had a realistic understanding of what it means to follow Jesus.

The leadership team is still brainstorming about what ministry will look like in this youth group and that process is about to get some more steam. We are still hopeful that others from the congregation will step up and join our team. The most important thing for students is NOT a good program, fun trips, or relevant messages. The most important thing for students is relationship, first with Jesus and then with His followers. Students need mentors, coaches and parents who are encouraging them in all the different areas of life. 
