From our Pastor

Jesus spent the last few days of His earthly life in conversations. During Maundy Thursday we often remember the events of that evening – the foot washings, the supper, the betrayal and arrest. This year we'll focus on the things that were said between Jesus and His disciples.

Jesus talked to them about who He was, and that He was going away, and that at times, they would not understand the things that would happen. He promised that though it appeared worse it would actually be better for Him to go because He would send them the gift of the Holy Spirit, to be with them and lead them.

Jesus must have been an incredibly accessible person because the disciples were free to express their doubts and questions. Surely the thought of all the things they had experienced with Him – His power in calming a huge storm one night; His ministry to the sick; and how they had done likewise when they went out on mission for Him. How could they forget it?

Their conversation with Him that night was probably what carried them through the trauma of His arrest, conviction, and death. The Maundy Thursday service is designed to help us enter into that evening, hearing the conversation as if we were the disciples, celebrating the Lord's Supper together in remembrance of Him.

Then, Good Friday's service continues the conversation with the choir's presentation of "The Seven Last Words of Christ," by Theodore Dubois. Jesus continued to talk from the cross, mostly to His Father. The music will be interspersed with depictions of the story from Scripture.

As I have worked to put the story, Jesus' words, and the music together in a meaningful way, an overwhelming sense of the grace of what Jesus has done for us became evident to me. He did it all – and His acts and words express the most magnificent love.

Then Easter Sunday as we celebrate the resurrection, it is my prayer that we take in His self-giving love and that we stand in awe. And may each of us know the joy of that love in a deeply personal way.

The following poem, based on Rembrandt's painting "Peter's Denial", is from *Drawn to the Light: Poem's on Rembrandt's Religious Paintings.** For one of your devotional times during Lent, you may want to ponder the painting as you read the Gospel account of Peter's denial in Matthew 26, Mark 14, Luke 22, and/or John 18 together with the poem. Can you imagine how Peter felt? How Jesus felt? How you feel about identifying yourself as a follower of Jesus?

Missions News ~ from India, and from the book of Numbers, A Story of Hope

Just after the Christmas holidays this year, which for many of us were marked by the violence



at Sandy Hook Elementary School, Jim and I went to India to teach at a seminary for three weeks. The headline news in India was about a young female medical student who was brutally raped on a public bus and then thrown off the bus. She died later of her injuries. The newspapers and television news reported all sorts of opinions from leaders and others, some of whom suggested that girls should be forced to wear overcoats as part of their school uniforms. It seemed like every day another similar crime was reported as families felt emboldened to denounce what had happened to their children. Riots broke out in the capitol protesting the violence against women.

The government put together a panel to recommend new laws that would help to eliminate the problem and within a few weeks their recommendation, covering all possible categories of sexual abuse, was announced. They had obviously been doing their research long before the incident that stirred up public opinion. They went as far as suggesting the appropriate punishment would be chemical castration.

I was already sensitized to brutal violence done to innocent victims when we reached the seminary. The first Tuesday evening we were invited to

join the women students' Bible storytelling club. Every Tuesday evening, the women students meet to learn to tell another Bible story. They asked us to share a story. I'd anticipated that they would and I searched for a message of hope to the young women who faced all sorts of discrimination. So I told the story of the Daughters of Zelophehad from Numbers 27:1-11. Just before Moses was to apportion the land to the twelve tribes of Israel, the five daughters of Zelophehad brought their petition to Moses asking that they be given the portion of land that their deceased father would have received. God tells Moses to give them the land since they had a legitimate complaint. I wanted the women to know that they were rightful members of

God's Kingdom and that He hears their requests. Some of the young women were moved to tears. Then for the remaining two and half weeks at the seminary, students came to me privately to share their stories and how encouraged they were by the story of the Daughters of Zelophehad. A simple gift of telling a Bible story can bring hope to people.
