# From our Elders

Did you ever get asked to go somewhere or do something and have to decline due to a commitment to something happening at the church? Sometimes this will lead to a little teasing about being "holier then thou" or being "sanctimonious" or worse yet being "religious". How do you respond? In the past I heard myself saying things like "I'm not religious. I mean, I can't quote chapter and verse of the Bible!" Or worse yet, I would make excuses like "well you know the wife is very active in the church and she has a lot of friends there and wants to participate." Not very faithful responses, are they! Some people try to avoid being labeled "Religious".

I said in the past, I oftentimes responded in such a manner--but not any more. Over the past five years I have seen too many wondrous things transpire within FPCD. I have become better equipped to pray silently and out loud. I have learned to become more trusting in the Lord. More trusting in my faith that I will have the answers when asked: why I have to go to church or choir practice? I try now to speak of my commitment to the Lord and his work. I tell my friends how much I enjoy the fellowship of the congregation. How much I really do enjoy singing, in spite of my limited talent. I now use this time to share the feeling of calmness I experience when leading the congregation as the Liturgist. To see and hear first hand what makes our congregation and church so special. The music program, the story telling, the children's time and the wonderful messages Ginger shares with us each Sunday.

It has taken me a while but I have learned to turn teasing into a time of Evangelism. And while I have had only limited success I will continue to "Connect with God and share the Good News of Jesus Christ with the community".

# Words from Worship

Acts 1:3 tells us, "During the forty days after his crucifixion, he appeared to the apostles from time to time, and he proved to them in many ways that he was actually alive. And he talked to them about the Kingdom of God."

Counting Easter Sunday as Day 1, we count 40 to get to Ascension Day, Thursday, May 10. Then 10 more days brings us to Pentecost Sunday, May 20. Most of us are more familiar with the significance for us of Pentecost, when God's Spirit was given to his people and displayed his power through an amazing multilingual proclamation of the Good News about the risen Jesus. What about Jesus' ascension?\*



Jesus' ascension gives us hope:

- as his resurrection set the pattern for our eventual resurrection, so his glorification after obedient emptying and humbling set the pattern for our eventual glorification.
- his departure was not an abandonment: not only has he sent his Spirit to us, but he has also promised to be with us always.
- he values us so highly that he has given us the privilege—and commandment—to carry out the job he began, of discipling all nations to follow him.
- for us to become like him and lead others to become like him (discipling), he has given us abundant resources:
- o the Holy Spirit of God himself
- o gifts for building us up and maturing us
- o his present work as our sympathetic, understanding high priest
- we have confidence as we come to God in prayer in all our needs
- we have confidence that he will come again for us, and that all the things that trouble his creation in which we now live—poverty, corruption, pollution, injustice of all kinds—will finally be set right, and all will acknowledge his supreme authority, wisdom, justice and love.

Meanwhile, we have much to go through—like our example, we have to learn obedience through the things which we suffer—whether bereavement, illness, academic challenges, hunger, financial stress,...Amidst all this, let us hold on to the message of hope given us in Jesus' ascending to his father, our father.



<u>Here's a recent posting about Sureste Theological Seminary</u> (see February newsletter, p. 6), <u>which our Presbyterian Women are</u> making their special mission project in 2012.—supported through, among other things, our April 29 Plant and Bake Sale:

The Presbyterian Church is growing very rapidly in Tabasco, Mexico. The population of the state of Tabasco is predominantly Protestant. The entire country is about 70% Catholic. Currently, there are about 1,000 churches in the Tabasco Synod area; however, they only have about 200 trained pastors to serve these churches. Many pastors are responsible for 10 to 12 churches.

Sureste Theological Seminary in Villahermosa, Tabasco is helping to train young men and women from the villages. After they are trained, they return to their homes as pastors and evangelists. Graduates from the seminary are filling many open positions. The Outreach Foundation was one of the initiators of this important, multi-year project.

In the year 2000, the seminary moved from a small site within the city of Villahermosa to the new site. This enabled the seminary to increase enrollment from 25 to the current

student body of 75. Contributions through The Outreach Foundation enabled the seminary to complete the first stage of construction which included: a large chapel that will seat 1,500; three housing units for the president of the seminary, the administrator, and a guest house; a large water cistern, storage building, and two large two story dormitory buildings....

Because of the limited facilities, many qualified students previously had to be turned away. There is now a great need for scholarships and other forms of financial aid so that the seminary can expand the student body. http://www.theoutreachfoundation.org/index.php?option=com k2&view=item&id=212:sureste-presbyterian-theological-seminary
