As we enter summer, we have come to the end of the study of Acts. What a rich study! The early church teaches us so much about how the body of Christ operates. I imagine you have been as impacted as I have been. The things that especially stand out about those early believers are their commitment to prayer, worship, giving, and the urgent, joyful mission to go out and share the good news. And, they did all this together! Just like us, they loved being together.

As I consider their lifestyle, and then look at all of you, I see marvelous similarities. You, too, pray consistently, worship regularly, give generously, and together we are learning the joys of inviting others to hear about the Lord Jesus Christ. And, when we invite others to experience God with us, God will "add to our number those who are being saved" (see Acts 2:47).

As we leave the story of Acts, we are going to talk about three basics that have to do with Christianity. They are, "believe, belong, and behave." Who belongs to God? Is it hard to be a Christian? What do we have to do? Jesus said, "Come unto me who are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest," and "My yoke is easy and my burden is light" and "You shall know the truth and the truth will set you free." That all sounds really good!

But sometimes Christians get a little wobbly about the basic truths of believing, belonging, and behaving and what makes us uniquely Christian. In fact, with the change in PC(USA) ordination standards that will happen this summer, it is very important to be clear on these truths so that when we communicate the gospel with others, we are being faithful.

If you have questions about any of these topics, be sure to let me know and I will address your questions throughout this sermon series. You can do so by sending an e-mail or calling the office. As we study, we will learn more and more how to share this wonderful lifestyle with our neighbors. Be prayerful about that, and ask God to help you see who you might talk with. I know God just can't wait to bless someone through you!

Words from Worship

Pentecost

June 12, 2011

The Christian Festival of Pentecost is based on the incident recounted in Acts 2 when the Holy Spirit came upon the Christian disciples gathered in the upper room at Jerusalem seven weeks after Easter. The appearance was made known by the sound "like the rush of a mighty wind" and by a light in the form of tongues "as of fire distributed and resting on each of them" (Acts 2:1-3)

The Jewish Pentecost which the disciples were celebrating at the time was the Feast of Weeks, a thanksgiving for the first fruits of the wheat harvest (Exodus 34:22). Later Christians in their worship for this week also remembered, by reading Number 11:24-30, the incident of the Spirit resting upon the seventy elder of Israel when they were in the wilderness with Moses.

Symbols appropriate to Pentecost are those indicating the appearance of god and his Holy Spirit. Chief among these is the dove. Red is the liturgical color used for the Day of Pentecost and it symbolizes the flames of fire seen at the time of the descent of the Holy Spirit on the disciples in Jerusalem.

Symbols of our Faith

Tongues of fire - The symbol of the power of the Holy Spirit.

A sailing ship - Representing the church

A pomegranate - Because of the unity of the many seeds in the one fruit,

it is said to resemble the church.

The Dove - Most traditional symbol of the Holy Spirit (Luke 3. vs 21&22)

The Seven Lamps - The gifts of the spirit

The font - A symbol of our baptism into the body of Christ.

Missions

In some of the letters from those we support, there have often been mentions of part of their job – checking the translation. Just how is that done? Recently I came across an article that had an interesting answer to that question. It comes from a publication of Wycliffe and gives a bit of insight into this task of a translator.

We Can't Have Two Josephs

Sometimes things seem perfectly clear when a translation team completes a first draft of a Scripture passage. But checking each verse of the draft often raises questions.

That's what happened to a team working in two Tanzanian languages—Zanaki and Ikuzu. The team included Patrick, a translation consultant; Michelle, a translation advisor; and several translators working in their mother tongues. Together they worked through some problem areas in their drafts of Luke chapters 1 and 2. Let's listen in.

Patrick: "In chapter 1, verse 64, your drafts say, 'His tongue was untied.' What does that mean?"



Translators: "It's an idiom for someone who talks after being silent."

Michelle: "Is it normally 'tongue' or 'mouth' in the idiom?"

Ikuzu translators: "'Tongue.' It's correct as is."

Zanaki translators: "We say 'mouth' and need to change it! We wrote 'tongue' because it's in the Swahili like that."

Michelle: "In chapter 2, verse 4, your drafts say, 'In the town of Nazareth, there was a man named Joseph.' Will readers think he's a new character in the story?"

Translators: "Yes—that's how we introduce new people."

Michelle: "But we met Joseph in chapter 1, verse 27."

Translators: "Oh no! You're right. It sounds like there are two Josephs!"

Patrick: "In chapter 2, verse 11, your drafts have the phrase 'city of David.' What does it mean for a city to be of someone?"

Translators: "That he was from it; that his descendants live there."

Patrick: "Great. That works well."

So you see, checking is not just looking for errors in spelling, or missing phrases, but also looks for clarity issues and strives for good understanding of the meaning of the passage. It is no wonder then that those who work in this area know the Word so well. And let's keep praying for all translators, translation checkers, and consultants!
