Belonging, believing, and behaving connote both benefits and obligations. To be a Christian means incredible benefits. We believe in a God who overflows with love for us; who is with us faithfully. Our God is not a "fair-weather" fan who cuts us off when we fail. No way. He sticks with us like glue, training us, teaching us, helping us to grow in maturity, courage, and faith.

We understand that faith means, as the Heidelberg Catechism states: "I belong – body and soul, in life and in death – not to myself but to my faithful Savior Jesus Christ . . . that he protects me so well that without the will of my Father in heaven not a hair can fall from my head." And, "Jesus Christ gives me the Holy Spirit and makes me wholeheartedly willing and ready from now on to live for him." (Q. 1) These are strong promises; worthy of commitment.

Our allegiance to Christ, if not life-threatening, should certainly be lifeaffecting. I like to see commitment ("behaving") as freeing. I am freed from sin, free from the delusion of a materialist and self-obsessed culture, and free of the power of the evil one. Jesus Christ truly wants us to be all we can be – the unique person that He lovingly made. I can't think of better people to be sur-



rounded by as we learn to be devoted together. Thank you for your growing commitment. It surely says volumes to others around you, who will surely be drawn to Christ because of you.

Meet the Simonses

Gary and Linda Simons have You have seen them in the Sunday school classes. They and SIL International. Their drew married to Laura, Daeral of you know, and two arrived).

Gary serves as SIL International's Chief Research Officer. He explains his job like this:

> We read in Daniel 7 and Revelation 7 that Christ's Kingdom is to include people from every tribe and nation and language. Our organization believes that foundational to establishing the kingdom within any language group is having God's Word in its own language. And foundational to the work of producing the Scriptures in a language that has never had them is the research that goes into understanding the language and culture, developing a writing system, and developing the terminology for talking about Bible times and spiritual concepts. In my role as Chief Research Officer, I am overseeing our research into the situation of all 6,900 known languages of the world (as reported to the world at www.ethnologue.com) monitoring the research performance in our approximately 1,500 active Bible translation projects, and helping to launch research projects (focused on methodology) which will improve the effectiveness of our Bible translation projects."





Gary and I both decided, at the age of 16, that we wanted to be missionaries when we grew up. In fact, Gary claims to never have had a "real job" in his entire life!

We did our early field work in the Solomon Islands, a small island nation north of Australia and east of Papua New Guinea. We first did language survey work there, and then worked as translation advisors for a group of languages on the island of Malaita. A unique aspect of our early work was that we were the first to use a "field computer." If you ever visit Gary's office at the International Linguistics Center, ask him to show you the personal computer that was built almost before there were personal computers.

Currently, I work half time as an administrative assistant in Gary's office. I also read to Gary, who is legally blind due to a hereditary, juvenile form of macular degeneration called Stargart's disease.

Did you know there has been a weekly confirmation class at FPCD over the last month? The course is called "Bible Blast" and it is geared toward teaching 5th graders and above about the basics of Christianity. During this class we examine issues such as: Worldviews, Monotheism,

The great thing was that many who came for the free food ended up staying for the concert as well. We were able to make connections with people who were interested in attending FPCD and had questions. My favorite part about the event was that we gave away the food and water with no questions asked. We had no agenda but only to serve the community around us. In this we were reminded of God's gracious sending of His Son Jesus. He was sent for our sake with no hidden agenda. Praise God!

This event was a team event but it wouldn't have been possible without the hard-work of Anna Murphy. She was exceptionally involved in the planning, execution and conclusion of this event. Others who helped were JR Hartless, Peggy Kezar, Anthony Jennings, Albert Teel, and the many who brought ice chests, ice and water. We hope to have a repeat performance next year. Grace & Peace!

Our **Dallas Mission Trip** with the Idaho Falls group went by super fast but very fun and inspirational. We would like to <u>thank</u> everyone who helped make this trip comfortable and possible for our students.

On the Mission Trip we did a lot of activities with low-income kids and people who are homeless. The first foundation we worked with was "<u>ELM</u>"—English Language Ministry. ELM provides English classes for mothers who need to learn the language; while they attended class we did crafts and games with their children.

The second foundation we worked with was <u>Vogel Alcove</u>, a day care for kids who live in shelters with their parents. The parents drop their kid off at this free day care while the parent goes to work, looks for a job, or goes to interviews. The third place we went to was <u>Grace Presbyterian Village</u>, the nursing home where some of our own church family live, where we got to visit with the elderly. We also got acquainted with The Stewpot and The Bridge. <u>The Stewpot</u> is a place homeless people can go to for medical and dental care and supplies. <u>The Bridge</u> is where we served the homeless food. We also helped with the <u>day camp</u> that First Presbyterian Church Dallas hosts every summer to low-income kids.

This week was very exciting for all the leaders and students involved. All the students were inspired by all of our activities with the Dallas Mission Trip.


