Personal Testimony

Why the Parable of Growing Seed (Mark4:26-29) Means so Much to Me

Back in March, 1980 my mom was getting ready to have surgery when her sister, Mary, gave her a book to get her mind off the surgery. It's called *Praying Without Ceasing*

The guidelines to an effective prayer life.

1. Make it simple and clear.
2. Be spiritually prepared through a complete attitude of confession.
3. Pray with a visionary eye of faith.
4. Be ready to listen to God and be receptive to His guidance.

It starts like this..... **Lord, make me want to pray**

Mom said to God, Heavenly Father, it is with much humility & meekness I present this Prayer List to you: for Ed-die, "read and study the Bible more; stop going places so much." For Brenda, "settle down and seek after God's will."

At the end of the prayer list she listed one for her.

My mom was the backbone of our family. She was both a mom and a dad. I owe a lot to her. She passed away 12-27-1992; Grant was only three months old. I couldn't understand then why God took her. I understand now, but it was really hard at that time.

Sowing seeds takes time, you must have faith that God will answer them.

Mom sowed some seeds to God. That was 29 years ago. I started reading the daily Bible from the church in 2009. Both Brenda and I have changed because God answered some prayers from my Mom.

Linda and Gary Simons are well known in our church. Gary has shared his music talent with us a number of times. Both of them sing in the choir. Before they began work here at the Dallas Linguistic Center, they worked for SIL in the Pacific area, first in language survey and then in the Solomon Islands as translation advisors. Here in Dallas Gary's role with SIL International is as the Chief Research Officer. Gary explains what that involves:

I've missed a few Sunday services recently because of international travel on CRO business. I thought a good way to give a glimpse of my role in the work of missions would be to tell you about those two trips.

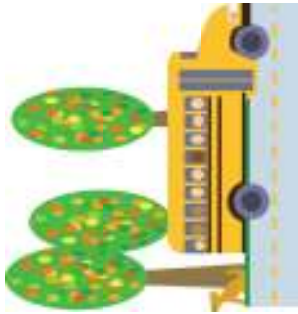
I missed the last Sunday of June (and our baseball night) because of a trip to Madrid, Spain. There I participated in the annual meeting of Technical Committee 37 of ISO, the International Standards Organization. One result of SIL's research into identifying every language on earth has been a system of three-letter codes for uniquely identifying each language. These are published as part of the *Ethnologue* (www.ethnologue.com).

We need these codes because language names are not reliable—they are ambiguous, they change over time, and they vary in translation. Ten years ago, ISO approached us about submitting our three-letter codes to become an international standard. Final adoption occurred in 2007 as ISO 639-3. These codes are now widely used across communities like missions, academics, international development and internet infrastructure. We just got word that they will even be used within the soon-to-be-released Windows 8. SIL continues to be involved as the Registration Authority for processing proposed changes to the standard.

In July I missed two Sundays on a trip to Papua New Guinea. There I participated in a workshop on the topic of "clustering." Traditionally, we used to approach each language with an independent project, but over the last decade we've realized that it would be smarter to build projects of language development and Bible translation around clusters of related languages. Our executive leadership has made the investigation of what has actually been happening in cluster programs a top research priority, so that we can document the best practices that are leading to improved efficiency and effectiveness.

Editors note: Our God is amazing. When the job requires ability to understand the difficulties of many languages, he brings along someone whom he gifts with the ability to do the task. "God does not call the qualified; He qualifies the called."

Dead Sea Scrolls Exhibition Opens in Ft. Worth

Representatives from the state of Israel, Hebrew University in Jerusalem, the state senate and the city of Fort Worth celebrated the opening of the Dead Sea Scrolls & the Bible exhibition at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, July 2. The ribbon-cutting ceremony marked the beginning of the six-month exhibition, which runs through **Jan. 13, 2013**.

The 21 Dead Sea Scrolls which are now on display at **Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary** in Fort Worth, Texas will provide the public with a rare opportunity to view in person some of the oldest known pieces of the Old Testament. Ironically, the largest archaeological discovery of the 20th Century was made by shepherds in 1947 who had no idea of the value of what they had discovered.

Interesting Facts:

The Dead Sea Scrolls were probably hidden during the First Jewish Revolt against the occupying Romans in A.D. 66 -70, when Qumran was destroyed and abandoned.

At first, few believed the scrolls could be more than a few hundred years old. But Carbon-14 testing and handwriting analysis confirmed some are more than 2,000 years old.

Even taking into consideration the dry climate and the protection provided by caves, the survival of the scrolls for so many centuries is astounding.

Using ink made from iron salts and tree fungus, and parchment made from goatskin, the Dead Sea Scroll scribes had to copy each word painstakingly by hand.

The Copper Scroll, from Cave 3, includes a list of underground hiding places believed by some to hold treasure. Text on the Dead Sea Scroll fragments has actually cleared up some of the differences between other historical biblical manuscripts and our modern translations.

American principles such as freedom, equality and justice can all be traced back to the Bible and Judaism.

Dead Sea Scrolls & the Bible is one of the most comprehensive Dead Sea Scrolls exhibitions ever assembled.

At least 12 fragments that were previously hidden in private collections are on public display for the first time ever.
