Austin Street Shelter...



...opened its doors on November 17, 1983, and for over two and a half decades has been an efficiently run, financially sound shelter for the homeless providing emergency care, food, showers, medicines and holistic psychosocial programs to rehabilitate.

The first shelter was created in 1983 when overcrowded mental health institutions left many with no alternative but a life on the streets. Developer Henry C. Beck Jr. and former Dallas Mayor Starke Taylor arranged to lease space at 723 Austin Street in downtown Dallas near Reunion Arena for \$1 per month. The shelter moved to its current location, 2929 Hickory Street in 1992.

Since November 17th, 1983, Austin Street Centre has developed into a "whole person" therapeutic community, evolving from a basic overnight emergency shelter facility (without air conditioning or cots!) to a full "Care Campus," complete with a transitional living facility, substance abuse facility, free-standing chapel and an outdoor playground for our shelter kids.

Supported by volunteers from 120 Dallas-area churches and civic organizations, and funded entirely by individuals and foundations, Austin Street Centre accepts no government funding from any level, and no United Way funding. Since its inception, Austin Street Centre has provided shelter for an average of 425 men, women and children each day - at no cost to the individual. And because we neither solicit nor do we accept government funding from any level, all services are provided at no cost to the taxpayers.

For many years now, we have participated in the Austin Street Centre "sandwich ministry". We provide 30 dozen sandwiches on the 4th Monday of each month...come rain, shine or holiday.

Our faithful deliverers of the sandwiches have been Mickey and Betty Jespersen. Now at the tender age of 81, "Doc" and Betty have decided that driving at night is probably not wise....so, we're looking for a few good men and women to team up, to take over their duty.

Very little time is required, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours a month. You come to the church, a little before 7:00 pm, pick-up the sandwiches and other items left for the Centre. Drive the items to the Centre, assist in unloading the items and return to your cool/warm, safe home, where you have all the comforts.



There will be a sign up sheet in the Narthex. Please help us continue this worthwhile ministry that has touched so many lives.



From our Missionaries...

Dear Friends at FPCD,



Our family is into a second year of home leave from our work in East Asia. Susan's father passed away in May this year. Dennis' father will soon enter full-time nursing care. These are big changes and it is good for us to be near our parents right now. This time in the US also has been a time for us to refresh ourselves and our skills. As well as that, we are getting some needed expertise with the education of our children.

The work that you sent us to do in East Asia fifteen years ago is progressing well. By the grace of God, there is new life, pushing through to the surface. Though we are living in Duncanville at this time, we continue to be in touch with things across the ocean. This month, Dennis is in East Asia to connect with people there for a few weeks.

We are humbled by your faithfulness. When we were preparing to go to East Asia as a married couple in 1995, FPCD began sending monthly gifts for our support. Since that time, the church has seen many changes—different pastors, different levels of membership, times of difficulty and prosperity—but your support for us personally and financially has been constant. Thanks for being a part of God's work and of our lives.

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We are back in Bole, Ghana, where we work on translating God's word into the Safaliba language. Amaaliya, a national translator, is drafting the book of Acts. He uses a digital audio recorder since he can't write while his wrist is in a cast. He and two other translation helpers, Eden and Ibrahim, are doing the exegetical check on the Gospel of Luke. Literacy classes are also taking place. Participants are enthusiastic about reading and writing Safaliba as well as reading God's word in their language. In Iddi's class there are over 40

people in all age groups, from children about 10 years old to adults in their 50s. The class meets in the evenings, with only a lantern for light; they usually have to use flashlights to see the blackboard. Their prayer is for funds for a gas lantern for the class, which they would know how to maintain.

Our family has been generally well. However please pray that we would stay healthy, especially as the rainy season now beginning always brings many more mosquitoes. One of Paul's projects is to work on the window and porch screens to close up holes that have developed in some of them.

Our language helper Amaaliya is recovering from his wrist injury that required a cast. That injury is healing well but another is giving him headaches. Please pray for him, that he will soon feel well again and able to continue helping with the translation.

- 4. Embrace the message of hope instead of fear.

Meet our new Youth Pastor

...of Assyrian descent, so I grew up in a tight-knit community. Many people believe the Assyrians of the Bible have long since been extinct. However, the Babylonians did not totally destroy the Assyrians but instead scattered them among the nations so that they no longer had their own land. The Assyrians preserved their language and culture in small pockets and are still scattered among the nations. Being Assyrian is one part of my story but the bigger and more significant part of my story has been my relationship with Jesus Christ. Assyrians are mainly Eastern Orthodox or Roman Catholic but I became a Protestant through a nondenominational evangelism booth at a local fair. It was through that booth that I first became aware of Christ's pursuit of me. From there I began attending church regularly and also became a leader at the Jr. High Youth Group. Many years later I felt called to full-time vocational ministry and so I began pursuing a Master's degree in theology from Dallas Seminary. I completed that degree about a year ago and now I am here with FPCD! I'm happy to be here and I look forward to getting to know this congregation.

I have an apartment in downtown Dallas and have been able to reconnect with some of my old friends from Seminary. I love music and my favorite band is U2. I love Middle Eastern food and welcome Dolma anytime. I love reading and am trying to build the biggest library in the history of world...well sort of. I am also an avid sports watcher and especially love the Super Bowl Champion New Orleans Saints. I'd love to catch Monday Night Football with any of you. My favorite theologians are Tom Wright and Walter Brueggemann. One of my favorite books is Surrender to Love by David Benner. I believe that students are faced with a major challenge because of the popular world-view they experience all around them. Students are constantly being bombarded with messages that are predominantly discouraging and unhelpful. Yet these messages are passed off as true and real. My view is that the Church is the only organism who can provide an interpretation of life which is objective and hopeful. Besides doing that, she also creates an environment where this interpretation can be shared, experienced and lived out. I believe that students need a relationship with the Risen Christ which is far more compelling then anything else. The Christian life is the outgrowth of a worldview which is driven by God's Spirit through His Word to the glory of the Father. The Holy Scriptures remind and guide our discussion of God's Master plan for the world. The Scriptures encapsulate the message of God's redemptive love which is relevant to any and every situation. The Message of the Bible is the true interpretation of the world around us.


I am single but wish to be married at some point in hopes of raising a family. Feel free to drop by my office any time and say hello.


