From our Session

Paul on Prayer

I enjoy reading the Bible in different ways. Recently, over a period of a few months, I read the New Testament letters. I was intrigued by how Paul's letters (the Apostle, not me!) have a lot of references to prayer. After reading his letters, I'd say prayer was a substantial part of his life. Perhaps you will be similarly impressed. Here are a few observations. (Scripture references are to the New Living Translation.)

What does Paul pray?

Paul often begins a letter by wishing his readers grace and peace. Although this is a wish, it is also a prayer since grace and peace come to people from God. This frequent wish or prayer reminds us that, although God gives us these gifts of grace and peace, He wants us to ask for them.

Paul thanks God for the people who are receiving his letter. He thanks God for their growth in the Christian life. He is grateful to God that they are choosing to express their faith in deeds of love and kindness. He also gives praise to God for His greatness and goodness. In Colossians 1:9 he prays that his readers will have knowledge of God's will and spiritual wisdom and understanding.

Have you had a thought that you need to pray for someone or something but didn't know what to ask God for in this particular situation? Paul teaches us in Romans 8:26 that the Holy Spirit prays for us – edits our prayers to make them in accordance with God's will. So, we can pray something not very specific, or even just pray without any detail words. It is a great relief to me to know this fact because I'm aware that I often don't know God's will for the situation but feel a need to pray.

How much does Paul pray?

When I set out to write this article, I had in mind that he prayed always – continuously. Indeed, in Colossians 1 Paul tells us this. Thus, I was surprised to read in another place that he prayed briefly (Galatians 1:3); he apparently wanted to get on with his complaint to the readers. Elsewhere (Philippians 1:3,4) he prays when the people "come to mind". Personally, I'm comforted to know that I'm not alone in praying with different amounts of enthusiasm in different situations!

Perhaps we can say that prayer was Paul's first thought in any situation and that he showed us by example that he had the habit of praying as his first action when dealing with people. "Lord, help me to learn from Paul's example".

Prayers answered 'no' or 'wait'

Even though Paul was an apostle, he had to accept God's responses to his prayers that were not what he wanted. There was the "thorn in the flesh" which Paul prayed more than once to be removed. There were travel plans to which God said 'no'. Paul doesn't say much about these. He does go on living and moving in the direction to which God has called him. He accepted his hardships, including imprisonment, and found joy in whatever God said. I conclude from reading about his difficulties and their outcomes that he exercised faith that God would continue to hear him when he prayed.

What might these thoughts mean to us?

Prayer should fit into our lives as a driving force.

Everyone needs prayer, even if only for the basics of grace and peace.

We can pray with confidence that the Holy Spirit will pray on our behalf and in our best interest.

We can trust God to show us His path for us be it pleasant or not.
